Introduction

Revered as one of Chicago's leading neighborhoods for shopping, dining, entertainment, and living, Lincoln Park offers something for everyone. Boutiques, specialty shops, and nationally recognized retailers line neighborhood sidewalks, with quick eats, fine dining, world-class attractions, and an expanse of lakefront just steps away. Only fifteen minutes north of downtown, Lincoln Park is home to major cultural institutions such as the **Chicago History Museum**, **Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum**, and

the <u>Lincoln Park Zoo</u> and <u>Conservatory</u>. The neighborhood is also home to world-renowned entertainment venues such as <u>Steppenwolf Theatre</u>, <u>The Second City</u>, and <u>Victory Gardens Theater</u>, among many others.


There are more than 1.3 million people living within a 20-minute drive of Lincoln Park. During the daytime, more than 100,000 employees and students have easy access to the businesses in Lincoln Park. Plentiful public transit is


provided by a <u>Metra</u> station, four <u>CTA</u> train stations, 14 bus lines, and 45 <u>Divvy</u> bike-sharing stations.

With a variety of residential offerings and quick access to Loop employment, it's no surprise that Lincoln Park is one of the most vibrant neighborhoods in Chicago. Planned developments in and adjacent to Lincoln Park promise about 500,000 square feet of new retail and office space and nearly 1,400 new housing units within the next five years. These new developments ensure that Lincoln Park will be a prime location for steady growth and enhanced business vitality in years to come.





Clark Street

Eclectic and energetic Clark Street is the "main street" of east Lincoln Park, and has a little bit of everything. With more than 80 places to eat and drink, more than 100 places to shop, and about 120 service businesses, this pedestrian paradise has it all. Clark Street is only steps from the park, beaches, **Lincoln Park Zoo**, **Chicago History Museum**, **Green City Market**, and the **Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum**, just to name a few local attractions. While Clark Street is a daily routine for locals, it's a regular place to stop to eat and shop for the millions who visit the area's destinations. The northern section of Clark Street (north of Fullerton) tends to attract more young professionals, while the southern section of Clark Street (south of Fullerton, near the Francis Parker School and Lincoln Park Zoo) tends to attract more families.

Because of Clark Street's proximity to Lake Michigan, it is bordered by several high-rise residential buildings and, as a result, has ready access to a large pool of shoppers. Since Clark Street stretches not only the length of Lincoln Park, but also flows into downtown Chicago, it accommodates a variety of affordable and convenient modes of transportation. From pedestrians and cyclists to cars and buses, Clark Street is always bustling.


Lincoln Avenue

With its wide sidewalks, attractive facades, and old-fashioned lamp posts, Lincoln Avenue is a frequent stop for residents and visitors seeking a bustling destination with outstanding amenities. Shoppers include not only local residents, but also thousands of students from **DePaul University** (just west of the intersection of Lincoln and Halsted), the largest Catholic university in the nation and the largest private institution in Chicago.

Lincoln Avenue is the epicenter of entertainment and nightlife in Lincoln Park. With world-class music and live theater venues plus lively pubs and delicious eats, people from around the corner, across Chicago, and all over the Midwest visit Lincoln Avenue in Lincoln Park to be entertained.

The northern section of Lincoln Avenue (Wrightwood to Diversey) has a cluster of health and wellness businesses, fitness studios, and medical offices.

This corridor is set to transform in the next five years, as Lincoln Avenue will be home to several new, high-end, mixed-use developments, including at the site of the former Children's Memorial Hospital, Webster Square, and Lincoln Centre. These projects will add about 1,000 new units of housing, and over 100,000 square feet of new retail and office space within the next five years.






Armitage-Halsted-Webster

The intersection of Armitage Avenue and Halsted Street is Lincoln Park at its vintage best. With turn-of-the-century Victorian homes and storefronts, this commercial area is so richly historic that the city selected it for landmark designation in order to preserve its traditional ambiance. More than a century old, this area is noted for its charming architecture and renowned retail mix. Nestled along Armitage Avenue, Halsted Street, and Webster Avenue are restaurants known for modern cuisine and stores of upscale fashion. Home to the famed **Lori's Designer Shoes** and Alinea Restaurant, this district vies for the top high-end retail shopping and dining destination in Chicago, if not the Midwest. The nightlife scene exudes a friendly and relaxed atmosphere featuring a host of neighborhood establishments.

Local residents in this upscale neighborhood provide consistent and loyal shoppers for area businesses. Visitors from across the Chicago travel this area to shop and dine. With **DePaul University** just around the corner, a steady stream of new and returning students brings yet another group of shoppers to the neighborhood. At any time of day, these avenues are bustling with pedestrians ready to unwind in a neighborhood filled with charm and character.




Clybourn Avenue

The intersection at North Avenue and Clybourn Avenue is the prime destination for shoppers looking for a wide variety of well-known local and national retail establishments. As a buffer between residential Lincoln Park and the industrial district along the North Branch of the Chicago River, the Clybourn corridor is a distinctive neighborhood shopping area. Ample parking, easy access via interstate 90/94, the North/Clybourn Red Line station, the Clybourn Metra station, and protected bike lanes along Clybourn make the area an easy-to-access shopper's paradise.

Clybourn is home to the original <u>Goose Island Brewery</u>, along with other Chicago-grown businesses like <u>Jayson Home</u>, <u>Artists Frame Service</u>, <u>Walter E. Smithe Furniture</u>, and Crate & Barrel. In addition, national brands like Apple, Arhaus, West Elm, Pottery Barn, and others provide all customers need to put the finishing touches on a home or apartment. Beyond home goods, the area boasts other local and national retail apparel brands, restaurants and one of the largest <u>Whole Foods Market</u> locations in the country.

In addition to shopping and dining, the district is home to new and long-time industrial and office businesses such as General Iron and C.H. Robinson, and boasts a strong daytime workforce in the loft-style offices that line Clybourn and the industrial, warehouse, and office tenants along the river and nearby Elston Avenue.
